Ready to get started? To begin working towards the Substance Abuse Disorder Professional certificate, you simply need to apply and be accepted to CBC. You can apply online at www.columbiabasin.edu.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Under the direct supervision of a licensed SUDP, Washington State Administrative Code (WAC) allows students to work within a treatment center as valuable members of the addiction recovery team. These students are referred to as Substance Use Disorder Professional Trainees (SUDP-T). Upon completion of the program and meeting additional WA State requirements, graduates may earn an SUDP license. Licensure requirements include earning a minimum of an associate degree, completing 2,500 supervised experience hours, and passing a state examination. Students without an associate degree or higher can complete CBC's Associate of Science in Health Science with an emphasis in SUDP studies. SUDPs work in various settings, including mental health centers, community health centers, and treatment facilities, providing essential advice and support to help clients recover and improve their health. They work both full-time and part-time, collaborating with other healthcare professionals to create comprehensive treatment plans. For students looking to further their education, CBC also offers a Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) in Community Health, providing additional opportunities for career advancement and specialization.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Substance Use Disorder Professional (SUDP) program at Columbia Basin College is an in-depth pathway within the Health Science Associate in Science (AS) degree specializing in substance use disorders. It is designed to align with the Washington State Department of Health's stringent requirements for SUDP certification and licensure, ensuring graduates are well-prepared for their roles in healthcare and social services.

SUDPs are crucial professionals who address the challenging and complex issues of addiction. They provide assessment, treatment, and recovery services to individuals, groups, and families, playing a pivotal role in fostering public health and community wellness. This program equips students with a comprehensive understanding of addiction, including its pharmacological, psychological, and social aspects. It covers a wide array of subjects like treatment methods, cultural competence, ethical practice, and case management. Through a blend of theoretical learning and practical application, students will develop the necessary skills to become compassionate, competent professionals in substance use disorder counseling.

Graduates of this program will complete the educational requirements needed to become Certified as a Substance Use Disorder Professional Trainee in Washington state. They will be well-prepared to embark on a fulfilling career, helping individuals overcome dependencies and achieve self-sufficiency, thereby contributing significantly to the field of healthcare and social services.

Degree Options

- The Substance Abuse Disorder Program has two options, a 1-year certificate (45 credits) and an associate degree (AS in Health Science with SUDP area of emphasis).
- An associate degree is required for a WA State license as a substance use disorder counseling trainee. So, students with a degree already may only need the 45-credit certificate. Students without a degree need to complete the AS in Health Science.
- After program completion and receiving the state trainee license, students need to complete 3,000 proctored hours to earn a full substance use disorder professional license. Prospective students need to realize that this process is done through an employee after program completion. CBC does not proctor these hours and the Substance Abuse Disorder program does not have a clinical component.
